

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#### NLP IS NOW ISO 9001:2015 CERTIFIED





August of 2017 marked the date for the NLP to start the process of preparing the agency for ISO 9001:2015 Quality Management System (ISO 9001:2015 QMS) adoptions. This is in compliance with Administrative Order No. 161 - Institutionalizing Quality Management System dated October 5, 2006 and Executive Order No. 605 –Institutionalizing the Structure, Mechanism and Standards to Implement the Government Quality Management Program (GQMP) dated February 23, 2007.

The activity is the agency's contribution to the GQMP's response to President Rodrigo R. Duterte's challenge to "make the people's lives better, safer and healthier".

Seventeen (17) months of dedicated efforts from the NLP management and staff have yielded fruit when we received the certificate on December 26, 2018 from the certifying body, Certification International Philippines (CIP), and this is valid until December 25, 2021.

# 5<sup>th</sup> International Conference on Children and Young Adult Librarianship (ICCYAL)

International Conference on Children and Young Adult Librarianship is another program spearheaded by the Reference Division through its Children's Section which started in 2012. It was then intended for local participants and speakers, but due to the demand and interest of children's libraries and librarianships in the country, it eventually became an international event after two (2) years of conducting it nationally. Thus, in 2014 we held the 1st ICCYAL in partnership again with LGU's through its public library. For 2018, this was in partnership with Cebu City Public Library.

This year for the 5th time, the National Library of the Philippines, in cooperation with the Local Government of Cebu City (LGU) through its library, hosted the 5th International Conference on Children and Young Adult's Librarianship (ICCYAL) with the

theme: "Information, Innovation, Inclusion to Diversify Children and Young Adult Libraries" last October 17-19, 2018 in Social Hall, Cebu Provincial Capitol, Cebu City. The main objective of the conference are: 1) To entice advocacy on inclusive library services; 2) highlight trends and practices on diverse libraries; and 3) discuss essential information in managing libraries.

The conference commenced with the processional entrance of the honorable guests and invited guest speakers followed by the entrance of colors headed the University of the Visayas Color Guards followed by a cultural presentation, national anthem and doxology by Childlink Learning Center and High School, Inc. The event was graced by Director Cesar Gilbert Q. Adriano, Mayor Tomas Osmeña of Cebu City, Prudenciana Cruz of NCCA-NCLIS. Right after the opening ceremonies was a keynote address from Jorun Systad, Chairperson of Libraries for Children and Young Adults Section of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions. The keynote address confer about the guidelines to experience and inspiration specifically stirring matters about creating high quality children's library services in modern society.

The conference was divided into three plenary sessions. Plenary session I is entitled "Information" which discuss policies, guidelines/standards and practices in libraries as well as information on children and young adult librarianship. Plenary session

II is "Innovation" which focuses on the conception and delivery of innovative programs and services for children and young adult libraries. Plenary session III is "Inclusion" and highlighted programs and services to cater diverse clients of children and young adult libraries. International and local speakers were invited to share their expertise, best practices and unique programs with the participants.

A total of 256 library and information science professionals from across the country participated the event.



A turnover ceremony for the next host of this conference was administered. A symbolic logo of ICCYAL was passed on by the National Library of the Philippines to Ms. Pedrita M. Badar, officer-in-charge of the Davao City Library and Information Center.

The event was concluded by Dolores Carungui, Chief Librarian of the Reference Division by sending out gratitude to all people behind the success of the conference. After the program proper and luncheon, a cultural and library tour organized by the Cebu City Public Library for the attendees was enjoyed by some of the participants. Feedbacks from the participants regarding the event garnered excellent results and positive remarks. Indeed, the conference has been a success.

#### **Disability Awareness Training**

In response to the institutional quality policy of the National Library of the Philippines, which is to "... ensure equitable access and provide inclusive services to support intellectual, cultural and national development," Reference Division through Library for the Blind Section initiated the conduct of Disability Awareness Training Program.

The training aims to: 1) build the capacity of public librarians and staff to create better library conditions and experience for persons with disabilities (PWD's); 2) orient library staff the basics of assisting visually impaired clients and 3) ensure inclusive library services. Participants were trained with necessary skills in dealing with library customers with visual and hearing disabilities.





Cluster 1 which were held last August 29-30, 2018 in Zamboanga City in cooperation with its Local Government Unit (LGU) through its library and was attended by 30 participants.





Cluster 2 was held at Kalibo, Aklan in cooperation with its LGU through its library. 30 participants attended the training.





Cluster 3 was held at Quezon Province last December 5-6, 2018 in Ouan's Farm Resort, Lucena City. This was attended by 30 participants

## Reducing Paper Waste through APT: *Librarians as Trainers in the Community*

Appropriate Paper-based Technology (APbT or APT) is a new initiative of Reference Division which generally aims to promote "public library as a place" to reach the grassroots level. Specifically, it is intended to promote waste reuse and recycling materials to counteract wastage and depletion of available resources; to capacitate public library stakeholders to actively develop affordable, practical assistive materials to become useful cascade such learning to public library beneficiaries.

This initiative is in line with NLP's goal to be a strong partner in poverty alleviation and empowerment of Filipinos through research support and training provider of the community. *Reducing Paper Waste through APT: Librarians as Trainers in the Community* is trying to ensure that libraries in the community will remain relevant and its services are innovating to meet the needs of the society.



APT is a cost-effective way to produce personally designed furniture or other objects for use and creativity. Materials are recycled: waste paper, thin card and cardboard boxes. Flour is used to make the paste and varnish or corrugated waterproof paint is helpful to seal the completed items. All that is needed in the way of tools are a kettle or pan to boil water, a suitable receptacle to make the paste, knives and a smooth stick. Once the techniques are mastered, endless variations on equipment can be made and a special workshop is not necessary. It is quite easy to make APT items in the home, outside in dry countries or in any community room. (http://www.floodmeadows.com/apbt)APT was introduced to NLP by the National Council on Disability Affairs (NCDA) in February. It was a "train the trainor" approach which aims to capacitate selected NLP participants to become expert in APT, who will eventually train public library stakeholders in the country.







This train the trainor APT workshop composed of 3 lecture sessions, five activities and 3 demonstrations was indeed a success because it was immediately cascaded in August in Davao City Public Library stakeholders.

#### **Basic Bookbinding Lecture and Workshop**

The Filipiniana Division in cooperation with the Public Library Division conducted various Workshops in 2018 about Preservation and Conservation of printed library collections. The Workshops aim to educate and train professionals, students, library staff and interested individuals on how to preserve their printed collections through lectures and workshops.

Generally, workshops begin with a short presentation about the cultural collections in NLP and the best practices implemented to preserve those collections. It will be followed by a short lecture on the basics of book binding where basic tools and applications are presented. Demo on mending tears, dry cleaning and enclosure preparations are also provided.

Materials for the workshops are then supplied to the participants and actual work begin. Each participant takes home one or all of his finished works after they have presented it. After the workshops, an open forum is held and participants are encouraged to share how they feel or ask questions about the workshops. All comments are collected and consolidated by the workshop facilitators for those are used as guide in improving the next workshops.

Closing remarks and distribution of certificates mark the conclusion of the workshops.







#### **The Chinese Corner Project**

The National Library of the Philippines has been in the forefront in uplifting public libraries and librarianship in the country. It is the lead agency in implementing bilateral programs on libraries and information management. Being a recipient of the Chinese Corner Project of China Hanban, it aims to help promote cooperation between the Philippines and China among its libraries, librarians and stakeholders. This objective will build and strengthen collaborative relationship between NLP and its affiliated public libraries, among local government officials, librarians, friends and supporters of the library and its community users.

For 2018, four Chinese Corners were launched in the following libraries:

1.) **Batanes Provincial Library (BPL)** which were attended by 52 participants from different institutions last March 9, 2018. A total of 20 titles/ 50 volumes of library materials from the Chinese Embassy thru the National Library of the Philippines were received by Mr. Romnick Henry Gayanillo of BPL to be included in the total collection.

#### **NLP Convenes NEFLI Participants**

The Network of Emerging Filipino Library Innovators (NEFLI) is a 3-year program of the Public Libraries Division, National Library of the Philippines (NLP). It is a national level implementation of the International Network of Emerging Library Innovators (INELI), which is one of the sustainability outcomes of the INELI – Association of Southeast Asian Nations (INELI-ASEAN) Project. The INELI-ASEAN Project was managed by the NLP from 2015 to 2018 through a funding grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

The NEFLI primarily engages public librarians in the country and other interested participants to leverage appropriate solutions that will enable public library leaders who share a common vision for economic, political and socio-cultural development, and integration, to strengthen capacities of public librarians in the country. It aims to enhance the leadership skills and create a vibrant network of emerging library leaders. More so, it builds capacity to provide ongoing leadership training and foster collaboration and strong partnership among stakeholders in the country. NEFLI has four (4) main activities which are expected outputs of the innovators:

- 1) Self-Assessment and Self Development Plans innovators will assess themselves on the following areas: group process, public presentations, trends in national and international public library services, innovation, change management, professional involvement, and others. Thereafter, they will identify activities, success indicators, and completion dates that will develop their skills on the above-mentioned areas, which will likewise improve the services of their libraries.
- 2) Completion of ten (10) online learning modules—these modules will develop the innovators' skills on Group Process or Working on Teams, Innovation, Managing Team Projects, Communication, Conflict Management, Time Management, Risk Management, Leadership, Service Quality Improvement, and Completing the Project.
- 3) Networking meetings or annual convenings these include workshops, library study visits, mentoring sessions, and time for socializing, with the aim of training the innovators to build mutual trust and encourage cooperation.
- 4) Implementation of innovative services through collaborative projects these projects will be developed by innovators with funding and administration support from their Sponsors and Institutional Partners. These can be implemented in the innovators' libraries when the program concludes.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Convening of NEFLI was held at the Ramada Manila Central in Binondo, Manila, on May 27-30, 2018. The main objective was to bring together public librarians as innovators and other key players from Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao for the orientation and discussion of deliverables and other important information of the project. Specific convening goals include: 1) to provide participants with the time and space to explore how to build and strengthen the network of public libraries in the country; 2) to familiarize the innovators on the online learning modules, self-development plans, and collaborative projects; 3) to clarify roles and functions of sponsors and mentors in undertaking NEFLI; 4) to establish partnership and to relationships with public library stakeholders; 5) to promote camaraderie among strengthen participants; and 6) to expose participants and delegates on various innovations in selected libraries in Metro Manila. It was participated in by 15 innovators, 2 Sponsors, and 5 mentors (who were previously INELI-ASEAN innovators), and 7 organizing team members. Two (2) innovators were unable to attend the 1<sup>st</sup> Convening due to personal reasons.

It was a 4-day of knowledge sharing, idea pitching, creataive expression, and fun for innovators! In this convening, innovators were able to log-in in the learning portal, come up with ideas for their collaborative projects, and learn from the inspirational sharing of Ms. Rosario Chua, City Librarian, Cebu City Public Library, regarding their 24/7 services, innovations, partnerships, collaborations, along with the library's challenges and present status. Workshops and everyday reflection through journal writing were carried out all throughout the convening to strengthen innovator's learning.

# Training Workshop on the Development of Children's Books in Mother Tongue

This training which provides knowledge in book writing aims to augment the scarce resources on children's books in mother that are available in Philippine public libraries. The following are the specific objectives of the training-workshop:

- 1. To spur development of story books in mother tongue;
- 2. To enrich local stories in mother tongue;
- 3. To promote love for books and reading through mother tongue; and
- 4. To explore the importance storytelling in creating local stories.

The learning outcomes expected from this training workshop are the following: 1) gain knowledge in the step-by-step process of story writing; 2) produce story books using Bloom Library Software; and 3) develop skills and apply the techniques in interactive storytelling. This project was implemented in the clusters of Luzon

and Visayas in cooperation with the Local Government Units (LGU's) through its library. Cluster 1 was conducted to 46 participants. The training workshop is composed of several subtopics such as story creation, introduction to Bloom

software and interactive storytelling.

Cluster 2 was in Visayas which was held in Iloilo City Public Library on May 15-17, 2018 to 51 participants who successfully completed the training. 51 translations and 51 original works were produced with the use of Hiligaynon and Kiniray-a dialect. Cluster 3 was held in Mindanao Region to 56 participants on June 26-28, 2018 at Rosario Pavilion Limketkai Center, Cagayan de Oro City, Misamis Oriental in partnership with Cagayan de Oro City Public Library. All participants are Cebuano language speaking people which made them eligible for the training. Book translators to Maranao, Bisaya and Cebuano are produced by the participants.

## It All Started and Ended in CONSAL: The Journey of the INELI-ASEAN Project of the National Library of the Philippines

The 17<sup>th</sup> Congress of Southeast Asian Librarians (CONSAL XVII), with the theme "Next Generation Libraries: Collaborate and Connect," was held at the Naypyitaw International Convention Center in Myanmar on 2-5 May 2018. This year's theme highlights the future role of the library and the information services profession. With around 600 delegates from countries in the ASEAN region and beyond, participants were treated to relevant discussions on various topics and issues affecting libraries, librarians, and the field as a whole.

The Opening Ceremonies of CONSAL XVII was graced by the State Counselor of Myanmar, Ms. Daw Aung San Suu Kyi, who welcomed all the delegates and delivered an opening speech. In her speech, she said that "CONSAL was launched 48 years ago, in 1970, with the objectives to promote the library and information development in the region, and to lead us towards greater participation in the international information community. Also, to provide a platform for the sharing and exchange of information and experience on issues in the field of librarianship, library and information sciences, documentation, information and related services in the region". Further, she said that the long history of CONSAL serves as an evidence of strength and unity of the organization. After her speech, she officially opened the congress by sounding the golden Mingalar gong three times.

This was followed by messages delivered by Mr. Thura U Aung Ko, Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture; Ms. Christine Mackenzie, President Elect, International Federation of Libraries and Associations (IFLA); and, Mr. U Than Aung, Chairman, Myanmar Library Association (MLA), who read the message of MLA Patron Sithu Dr. Thaw Kaung. Special musical numbers were also performed by artists from the Ministry of Affairs and Culture and Department of Fine Arts performed to the tune of the ASEAN song and the CONSAL XVII theme song. Reyno, Technical Senrio Staff, with Prof. Rhea Rowena U. Apolinario, Consultant, attended the sessions of some INELI-ASEAN innovators, namely: Mr. Aung Than Htut - Innovative Library Activities in Myanmar; Ms. Tran My Dung – Marketing Activities at the National Library of Vietnam: Opportunities and Challenges, and Mr. Irhamni – The Role of Public Libraries Network in ASEAN Economic Community: A Preliminary Study on ASEAN Public Library and Information Network.

But the main reason why the Project Team attended the CONSAL was to present the initial evaluation of the INELI ASEAN Project, which was entitled "Building Capacities and Fostering Collaboration through the INELI-ASEAN Project." The paper presented aimed to impart and share the INELI-ASEAN Project and how it helped public librarians and libraries in the region build societies through capacity building and the creation of sustainable library projects or programs. ### Do we know our collection?

As the National Library of the Philippines (NLP) continues acquire/subscribe to online databases and electronic resources, there is also a need for NLP employees especially those who are assigned in reading rooms and Bids and Awards Committee (BAC) inspectors



understand how they are being accessed, utilized, and promoted in order to better serve the information needs of the general public.

To increase awareness on databases and e-resources, the Collection Development Division (CDD) headed by Ms. Susan J. Fetalco organized an E-Resources Forum held last August 2, 2018 at the ITD Training Area which was participated by NLP employees from different Divisions, BAC members and vendors. NLP Director Cesar Gilbert Q. Adriano and Assistant Director Edgardo B. Quiros were able to grace the event.

Representatives from LibTECH Source Philippines Inc., TelCreate Enterprise, MegaTEXTS Phil., Inc., New Century Book, CE-Logic, Inc., Phoenix Educational Service, Inc., and Emerald Headway were invited to discuss the 2017 usage statistics of NLP's subscribed databases. Aside from numbers and statistics, the forum also focused on the benefits & usefulness of the NLP's current e-resources collection, staff training on handling & monitoring of statistical reports, e-resources remote access, and ways on how to strategically promote and market the collection.

Guest speaker Ms.Venus Oruga, Acquisitions / Systems Librarian from the Lyceum University of the Philippines discussed the LPU-Library's journey from print to electronic resources. She shared how the students, faculty members and other library users utilized and benefited from their e-resources collection.

The CDD are planning to conduct more e-resources forums/trainings for other NLP employees and end-users such as students, researchers, schools and universities, and public libraries.

To sum up, there was a total of 385 patrons were provided with special workshops/ trainings and 6,840 patrons accommodated in 186 children's sessions of storytelling, read aloud, puppet shows, mascot appearances from across the country, and that there were 2,520 certifications issued (i. e certificate of participation/attendance) on these CS-conducted activities/workshops. Indeed, learning does not need to be expensive and pretentious to be successful.

It just needs a recipe of passion, willingness and patience. This library hour is another clear indication of the library's role in nation building and learnedness.

#### World Puppetry Day

This event is advocated by UNIMA (Union Internationale De La Marionnette) which is a non-governmental organization affiliated to UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization). It is the first international association of theatre in the world.

UNIMA in a short time built itself up from a small circle of friends into a world organization. The first members of UNIMA came from the world of puppetry but half of founders came from other professions. The fundamental founding principle of UNIMA was: reject any barriers to cooperation. This is being adopted by NLP in line with its advocacy on inclusive library services, and this is the 1<sup>st</sup> year that NLP joins the celebration.

In this activity, CS accommodated mostly students. There were three (3) puppet shows conducted which was obviously well accepted by the childrenwhich was showcased with storytelling and mascot appearances.

#### 35th National Children's Book Day



The National Children's Book Day is an annual event held every 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of the Month of July. Spearheaded by the Philippine Board on Books for Young People (PBBY) and recognizes the best works of children's book writers, illustrations, and publishers. Most importantly, NCBD celebrates the importance of nurturing the curiosity and imagination of young readers.

Last July 17, 2018, NCBD with the theme "Sa Aklat May Laya" was held at the Cultural Center of the Philippines, Lobby for the Opening Ceremonies. Many Writers,

#### STATUS REPORT OF PHILIPPINE PUBLIC LIBRARIES AND LIBRARIANSHIP

The purpose of the research is to know the current situation of public libraries in the Philippines for development planning. The objectives of the research entitled "Status Report of Philippine Public Libraries and Librarianship" are: to gather baseline data for the purpose of further studies and research on public libraries; to measure basic and various aspects of the public libraries in the country; to improve gathering of data on public libraries as a continuing monitoring task of the National Library of the Philippines, and be able to find out the needs of the public libraries in order to suggest and recommend solutions to concerned authorities.

The research is quantitative and qualitative descriptive study. It made use of survey method as a main data collection method and was supplemented by focus group discussions and use of secondary data for validation and appreciation of data findings. There were a total of 433 public libraries surveyed with representations from all the regional subdivisions across the country as well as 648 user respondents also coming from the regional representations of the public libraries.

Plenary Hall in Kuala Lumpur's Convention Centre came alive in spectacular fashion on Saturday 25 August, as over 3500 delegates from more than 110 countries filled Malaysia's premier convention venue to experience the official opening of the 84th IFLA General Conference and Assembly. The Congress theme of "Transform libraries: Transform societies", along with its equally important companion tagline of 'Reaching out



to the hard to reach', reverberated throughout the session as the kick off another WLIC—the international flagship professional and trade event for the inforlibrary and mation services sector.

international agenda for the profession and offered opportunities for networking and professional development to all delegates. With the support of the National Library of Malaysia, the ISSN International Centre organized an information and training session for 15 representatives of Asian ISSN National Centres in Kuala Lumpur prior to 2018 IFLA Conference. 

#### **Bibliographic Services Division (BSD)**

The Bibliographic Services Division's main task is to compile the Philippine National Bibliography (PNB) and serves as the National Center of the Philippines for International Standard Numbers for books, serials and music (ISBN, ISSN, ISMN). It also indexes serial publications so that they may be found more easily in the Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC).

#### **Catalog Division (CD)**

The Catalog Division serves a vital function of the NLP, ensuring that the books of the NLP and affiliated public libraries are properly catalogued so that they may be easily found on the shelves and the online public access catalog (OPAC). The division also do the Cataloguing in Publication (CIP) of book publishers and sets cataloguing standards for the country, such as
